 - School: the name of your child's school
 - Language: the language of your choice
- 4. Complete the survey by clicking on the appropriate circle to answer each question. Move to the next set of questions by clicking on the right arrow in the bottom right corner of the screen. Click on the left arrow to navigate backwards.
- 5. When you are finished the survey, you will get a message "Thank you for sharing your views".
- 6. Once complete, your school will have the results immediately.

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Mr. Aka's class- 7 Grandfather Teachings

We were able to have a nice reflective discussion at end of day about our learning around the 7 Grandfather teachings amidst the anxiousness of spring break starting soon. Letting the students drive the discussion, I posed 3 prompts: 1) When I heard we were going to learn about the 7 Grandfather teachings, I thought..., 2) As we explored each trait, I began to understand more about... and 3) In the end, the attribute(s) that connected with me was... because...

We began February with the understanding that Harmony Day and Pink Shirt day were observances that were coming up, and there were mixed feelings of what February would be like. Conversations around acceptance of different lifestyles and cultures were hot topics in the classroom and drawing comparisons/ contrasts to the social studies unit on first immigrants to Canada, really helped set the tone for February. We thought of all the "don'ts" that come with understanding the differences between people, ie. don't treat people different because of their skin colour; don't bully those who can't speak up for themselves, etc. but we also recognized that we hadn't really talked about the "do's". With that in mind, we used this idea as the launching point for the 7 Grandfather teachings. These 7 teachings of the Indigenous people tell us of the character traits that we must live and breathe for communities to thrive, people to connect with nature, and to help us become better people. Using those 3 prompts, this is what the students said:

1) When I heard we were going to learn about the 7 Grandfather teachings, I thought...

"At the beginning, all the traits Mr. Aka talked about sounded similar, but different. I didn't understand how these were teachings from grandfathers."

"I thought these 7 grandfathers were the first people on Earth from the Indigenous peoples' point of view."

2) As we explored each trait, I began to understand more about...

"I understood the connections between the spirit animals and the character traits they represented."

"I liked the story about how early people weren't being so nice to each other, so these values were needed to help everyone get along better as a community."

3) In the end, the attribute(s) that connected with me was... because...

"I chose my spirit animal because I thought it was the trait that I could work on to become a better friend."

"I wish I could have done more because I really connected with the art."

"I could only choose one spirit animal, even though I wish I could have done a couple more because I know I need to work on more than one trait, for me and for my family."
